## Colorado 2005 FIFRA Section 18 Emergency Exemptions

Section 18 of the Federal Insecticide, Fungicide, and Rodenticide Act (FIFRA) authorizes the EPA to allow States to use a pesticide for a limited time if EPA determines that emergency conditions exist. The uses are requested for a limited period of time, to address the emergency situation only.

Section 18 emergency exemptions are used when there are no other federally registered pesticides available to control a serious pest problem and there would be significant economic loss without the use of the Section 18 pesticide.

Section 18 uses are restricted for retail sale to and use only by private or commercial applicators or persons under their direct supervision. Pesticide

applicators must have and follow the Section 18 use directions as well as the EPA-registered label at the time of application.

A permit is required from the Colorado Department of Agriculture (CDA) in order to use a Section 18 product. There is no charge for this permit.

#### Meet the Colorado CCA Board—Ron Schierer

I am married with a 14 year old son, 14 year old daughter, and 6 year old son. This is my second time on the Colorado CCA board. I was on the original board which was initiated after public and private support came together to start the program in Colorado.

My experience in agriculture has been diverse and widespread. I grew up in Illinois in the heart of corn soybean country. I went to school at Kansas State University and graduated in 1980 with an agronomy degree. I began working with producers as an NRCS (Natural Resources Conservation Service) employee in Kansas while attending KSU. Upon graduation from college I went to work for NRCS in Washington State. I worked in the winter wheat

fallow region with some three year rotations and irrigated agriculture.

I then transferred to Greeley, Colorado as Area Agronomist and assisted the NRCS field offices in northeastern Colorado. My work in Colorado has been with irrigated and dry land crop rotations.

I currently am working on a master's degree from CSU which is involved with phosphorus runoff from soils receiving manure. The goal of the research is to determine soil properties which can be identified which reduce phosphorus runoff. I also am reviewing and helping to develop CNMPs (Comprehensive Nutrient Management Plans) developed by NRCS employees in eastern Colorado.

# Online Survey on Herbicide Tolerant and Insect Resistant Crops

Herbicide tolerant and insect resistant (HTIR) crops can simplify pest management and have a variety of effects on the environment. While many of these impacts are positive, most growers, researchers, and regulators recognize that problems can arise if these technologies are not properly managed.

To improve understanding of the impacts of HTIR crops in the Western U.S., a group of Western crop, insect, and weed scientists has developed on online survey. The purpose of the survey

is to gather input on the consequences of HTIR crops in the West, especially with regard to their impacts on integrated pest management (IPM) practices. Results will be used to develop a set of priorities for research and information needs regarding appropriate management of HTIR crops. The survey is funded by the USDA-Western IPM Center.

To complete the survey, proceed to http://lamar.colostate.edu/~htiripm/, then click on the Survey link. The estimated time for completion is 5 to 10 minutes.
