Your CCA board held its spring meeting on March 2, 2006. We welcomed three new members to the board: Erin Pease (from the Colorado Department of Public Health and the Environment); Paul Barr (representing the Rocky Mountain Agri-Business Association) and Troy Bauder (CSU-Cooperative Extension). They are replacing 3 members who had reached their maximum of two 3-year terms on the board: Ron Jepson, Jeff Riley, and Sandra McDonald. These three deserve your thanks and appreciation for their years of service on this advisory board!

Other items discussed at this board meeting:

We have changed the name of the "Education Committee" to the "Marketing, Promotion, and Education Committee" and increased the budget for this area. We agreed on having a Colorado

CCA booth to advertise CCA's at upcoming meetings attended by Colorado growers and consultants. Darrel Mertens is now the committee chair. If you have other ideas on how we can let your customers or employers know the value of your CCA credentials, let Darrel or any other board member know!!

- Discussions continue at the ICCA level regarding potential changes to the relationship between ICCA and the American Society of Agronomy.
- We reviewed test questions in the Crop Management category for future Colorado CCA exams.
- The number of CEUs in Nutrient Management in 2005 improved significantly over 2004, and the total approved CEUs was slightly higher in 2005 than in 2004.

International Certified Crop Adviser Board News

The ICCA board met at the end of February and passed the following actions:

- ICCA has made the CCA CEU requirements the same for all States. In the past, each State was allowed to deviate from the ICCA rules.
- ICCA will now allow 20 hours of CEUs to be self reported in a 2year period. This is a change from the past rule which allowed each State to make this decision. This does not impact Colorado, as we already allow 20 hours of self reported CEUs.
- No minimum or maximum CEUs in the Professional Development category is required. The minimum total of 40 CEUs with at least 5 in each of the 4 major categories remains the same.
- Reciprocity agreements are no longer necessary between States or Regions. CCAs can earn CEUs in any State or Region and receive credit for them. It does not impact CCAs transferring to other states/regions. The Local Boards will determine what is required for a CCA to transfer into their jurisdiction.

News from Colorado Department of Agriculture

The recent Colorado legislative session resulted in passage of two separate bills that are bringing changes to CDA's pesticide applicator regulatory program. The Pesticide Applicator Act (PAA) has been undergoing sunset review during the past year, and this process resulted in a bill that reinstated the PAA with some changes. Several changes were made concerning the Pesticide Sensitive Registry, but applications under agricultural categories still do not require notification. If any of you ever missed the deadline for renewal and had to retake the Certified Operator or Qualified Supervisor tests, you will be happy to learn the PAA will now allow reinstatement of licenses (without retesting!) up to six months after the expiration date. A late fee will be assessed. However, all CEC requirements will need to have been met prior to the expiration date.

Major change will result from passage of the Private Applicator Bill, which will allow CDA to certify private pesticide applicators and give CDA enforcement authority for all pesticide misuse in the state. We expect delegated authority for private applicators to be transferred from EPA Region 8 to CDA during the upcoming year. The CDA is currently drafting rules pertaining to both bills. Colorado Special Local Need 24(c) Registrations

Under Section 24(c) of FIFRA, Colorado can register additional uses of a federally registered pesticide. These additional uses are for distribution and use within a particular state to meet a "special local need" (SLN).

The purpose of state registrations is to cut the time, expense, and red tape involved in registering a pesticide for a special local use. The pesticide may be needed to treat a pest infestation which is a problem in Colorado but which is not

sufficiently widespread to warrant the expense and difficulties of federal registration.

An applicator must have the 24(c) Supplemental Label in their possession to apply SLN products. For more information on Section 24(c)'s, go to http://wsprod.colostate.edu/cwis79/Factsheets/Sheets/138web.pdf or contact Laura Quakenbush with CDA at 303-239-4147.

Colorado 2006 FIFRA Section 18 Emergency Exemptions

Section 18 of the Federal Insecticide, Fungicide, and Rodenticide Act (FIFRA) authorizes the EPA to allow States to use a pesticide for a limited time if EPA determines that emergency conditions exist. The uses are requested for a limited period of time, to address the emergency situation only.

Section 18 emergency exemptions are used when there are no other federally registered pesticides available to control a serious pest problem and there would be significant economic loss without the use of the Section 18 pesticide.

Section 18 uses are restricted for retail sale to and use only by private or commercial applicators or

persons under their direct supervision. Pesticide applicators must have and follow the Section 18 use directions as well as the EPA-registered label at the time of application.

A permit is required from the Colorado Department of Agriculture (CDA) in order to use a Section 18 product. There is no charge for this permit.
