Nutrient Management CEUs Available

Five CEUs in Nutrient Management have been nationally approved by the ICCA Board for self study. "Managing Nitrogen and Phosphorus in Organic Amendments" provides you with practical information and tools that can be used to assess the fate of N and P in land-applied organic amendments such as biosolids, manures, sludges, and composts.

The course includes a 51 page textbook and an Excel Workbooks diskette which

can be used to estimate agriculturally and environmentally important aspects of the N and P cycles including a N Balance Sheet and P Index. Self-study exam sheets are provided.

Self-Study vs. Self-Directed CEUs

The difference between self-study and self-directed continuing education units (CEUs) continues to cause confusion among CCAs.

Self-study credits are those that are preapproved by the Colorado Continuing Education Committee or the International CCA board. To obtain credit for self-study CEUs, the CCA registrant must complete an exam on the material and achieve a passing score of 70% or provide proof of successful completion of a correspondence course. Self-study materials are most readily found on the American Society of Agronomy CCA website at http://www.agronomy.org/ cca/exams/ or in the CCA Advantage newsletter found in the Crop Decisions magazine. An electronic version of the CCA Advantage, including over 15 selfstudy exams, is available at http://www. cropdecisions.com. Completed exams should be sent to ASA c/o CCA Self

Study Exam, 677 S. Segoe Road, Madison, Wisconsin 53711.

Self-directed CEUs are continuing education events including meetings, seminars, symposia, and/or short courses that meet one or more of the ICCA performance objectives, but are not preapproved by the Colorado CCA board. CCAs applying for self-directed CEUs need to fill out a CEU reporting form to get credit. CEU reporting forms are available online at http://www.agronomy.org/cca/ceu_reporting_form. html.

Colorado CCAs are required to have a minimum of 20 board-approved CEUs. The remaining 20 hours can be any combination of self-study, self-directed

or boardapproved credits.



Meet the Colorado CCA Board—Merlin Van Deraa

I was born and raised in Kimberly, Wisconsin.
